Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

Statement of intent

Embsay School has only a small number of children in receipt of Pupil Premium. These children are catered for on an individual basis within the school community to support them to achieve their potential. The amount and nature of the support required differs from child to child. Pupil Premium funding is therefore allocated on both a general and more specific basis.

High-quality teaching is at the heart of our approach, with a focus on areas in which disadvantaged pupils require the most support. This is proven to have the greatest impact on closing the disadvantage attainment gap and at the same time will benefit the non-disadvantaged pupils in our school. Implicit in the intended outcomes detailed below, is the intention that non-disadvantaged pupils' attainment will be sustained and improved alongside progress for their disadvantaged peers.

Challenges

Aim	Outcome
Improved ability to work independently and with peers Greater emotional awareness/resilience	Children completed work online using resources provided during lockdown. Extra telephone or in school support (many attended during lockdown) provided. No significant issues on return.
Improved attainment in maths	Children and parents had more support available at home which was used significantly during lockdown.
Improved attainment in writing	Significant focus during Autumn and Summer terms.
Improved learning outcomes for children in receipt of pupil premium funding	Difficult to measure as a result of interrupted time in school.
Greater confidence self esteem	Difficult to quantify, but children feel able to discuss issues with class teacher or pastoral worker in safe environment
